

# CSP Celebrates 25 Years.



I haven't had the pleasure of meeting you, however I have heard your name mentioned many a time.

I wanted to write a brief e-mail to let you know just how much the emergency accommodation means to police officers and their families in a time of need.

During the past few years I have had cause to use the accommodation many times, during 2011 for an entire month. I am fortunate that my health is good now and I only need to visit Brisbane two or three times a year for medical procedures.

I do not like to complain as I am well, but without the emergency accommodation there is no way my husband, and children would have been able to provide me love and support from 700k's away, it was tremendous having the use of the accommodation. The high standard of accommodation provided by the chaplaincy would be out of the question for us financially, if we were required to pay the going rate at a motel/apartment for example.

I have stayed at all the accommodation you have at one stage and NOT ONCE was the accommodation unclean or not maintained to an excellent standard.

I was wondering if you would be kind enough to pass onto your volunteers just how wonderful it is to walk into a place that is to become our haven for sometimes a week, sometimes longer and find everything spotless and clean. The units/apartments and the house at Nundah are really beautiful with tasteful furniture and every appliance one would ever need. They are a true home away from home.

I really don't know if you and your volunteers are really aware of what you have done for my family and I, and we will be forever grateful. There are many, many police officers in Rockhampton Police District who I have had conversations with about CSP, they also would be lost without your help.



The above letter was received from one of the officers who has had need to use the Emergency Accommodation provided by Community Supporting Police. (CSP). Although the units and house are owned by the Service CSP volunteers sell Police branded merchandise (see page 11) and hold events including the Behind the Crime nights & Shop till You Drop Bus Tours (see pages 3, 5, 6) to raise the funds to maintain the units: pay for cleaning and utility bills; provide linen, furnishings, electrical and white appliances and basic starter pack groceries to ensure guests are comfortable.

Following on from our front page collage and the lovely thank you letter which was recently received.

Community Supporting Police (CSP) also has units located across the state in: Toowoomba, Cairns, Rockhampton, Townsville and Einasleigh, for members of the Queensland Police Service and their immediate families to use in times of crisis and trauma. These regional and remote facilities are maintained by the dedicated members of local CSP branches, the contact details for which are provided above.

Like the emergency accommodation facilities in Brisbane application for use to these units and houses can be made through your local chaplain. Alternatively, contact your local CSP/HH representative who will be able to provide you with relevant information.

Just a little bit of history, the first welfare house was Rosalie House (a former Police Station at Fernberg Rd Rosalie), which the team of willing volunteers (from CSP, Lions, Rotary, Apex, Police Officers from Oxley Academy) caringly restored throughout 1991. Rosalie House was officially opened 5th June 1992 and continued to provide accommodation until 2005 when the QPS decided to sell the property.

A second house, Woody Point Cottage, was opened on 23 August 1996, with the Redcliffe Police Station taking care of the maintenance and bookings. In 2004 the Woody Point Cottage was no longer used by CSP and was sold by the QPS, the furnishings and fittings were moved to the Nundah Police Station residence. This residence eventually became known as Perry Irwin House.

## QUEENSLAND POLICE SERVICE CHAPLAINCY



Chaplain Graeme Ramsden (pictured left with Commissioner Stewart) was awarded his Certificate of Service for 10 years and was farewelled by the Chaplains and guests. Tonight we farewell Graeme as he enters retirement and thank him for his dedication.

Graeme was born in Kingaroy and was educated at Brooklands State and Kingaroy High School. Graeme worked as a milkman and joined the Citizens Military Forces in 1965, then in 1966 Graeme transferred to the Australian Regular Army. After he completed his trade as a vehicle mechanic, Graeme accepted a Commission and was posted: around Australia, to Vietnam and Singapore. This was the beginning of forty years of service to the Army and Australia.

Graeme was ordained a Catholic Deacon by the Military Bishop at Enoggera in 1992 and served as Army Chaplain deployed in East Timor in 1999 and was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in the Military Division.

Then on 20th February 2006 Graeme was appointed Senior Police Chaplain, becoming a part-time Chaplain 1 July 2015. During his time as Police Chaplain Graeme has worked in the South Eastern Region, Training and Development as well as in the Brisbane Region.

his retirement.

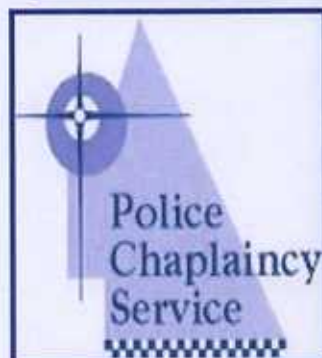
